Urban Blenz 'zine supports After school programs



Urban Blends is pilot publication created to demonstrate, illustrate and recognize the efforts and talent of youth in the various Denver Parks and Recreation After School Program **Social Opportunities**

thru Arts and Recreation (SOAR). Featured in the 200 Urban Blends 'zine are F.R.E.S.H, Urban Lens, and All About the Arts clubs.

F.R.E.S.H. - Friends Respecting Everyone's Success through Hip-Hop (F.R.E.S.H.) is a recreation, culture and arts program created by a partnership between Denver Parks and Recreation's Community Recreation and local Hip-Hop community leaders. F.R.E.S.H. program instructors seek to assist youth in learning how to express themselves through indigenous Hip-Hop themes and cultural norms.

All About the Arts - This art program is designed to expose middle school students to a variety of fine art styles and techniques. Students use an array of mediums that include conte crayons, watercolors, acrylic painting, and sculpting develop their skills and personal style. Through this program they work on projects independently, with partners, and in groups, with a mural being their final project.

Urban Lens - program is a twelve-week, classroom-based, art program for students, ages 11 to 14. They learn the fundamentals of black and white photography, including hands-on dark room instruction. The class consisted of classroom lectures, hands-on demonstrations, darkroom lab time and field trips to take photographs. The program also included a literacy component, with creative writing assignments inspired by the student's photographs.

Red Dragons seen in Natural Areas

City Naturalist Gayle Weinstein and the Natural Areas Program staff garnered a recent Environmental Health Grant to purchase \$18,000 worth of innovative, weed killing machines called Red Dragons. Pulled behind or along side a tractor, the Red Dragon sears the weeds and seeds in the soil with intense, propane heat. It's a travelling "controlled heat machine" that may prove to be



effective in eradicating weeds seeds that will shorten the time it takes to restore Denver's original prairie and riparian plant communities. This summer, natural areas staff will be "flaming areas at Camp Rollandet, Johnson Habitat, Prairie Park Preserve, among others.

The Natural Areas Program, initiated in 1999 cares for 260 acres of parkland and a similar amount of non developed city-owned land. Years of intense restoration efforts--- selective mowing, hand weeding, goat grazing, and seeding of native species---are evident in the beautiful, diverse native grasses, flowers, and shrubs found in Babi-Yar Park, Paul Henzell Park, Westerly Creek at Stapleton, BowMar Park. Not only do these areas provide an unfolding display of over 100 types of grasses and wildflowers, they are the corridors for Denver's urban wildlife and our most sustainable parks. As water and funding tighten up, more and more bluegrass will make way for these water conserving more sustainable landscapes. Scale and type will vary. Smaller areas with 1 to five species of Colorado grasses or xeric shrubs. Larger areas with the potential of performing as a sustainable system will be either restored to its more original state (Babi-Yar Park) or naturalized to represent the eastern plains Colorado landscapes.

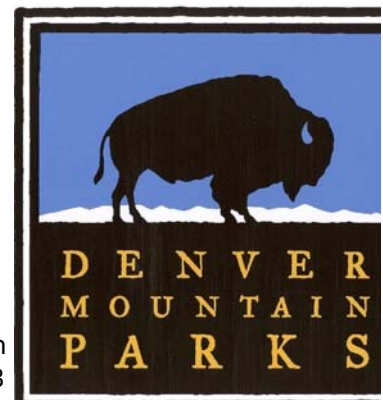
Saddle up for Buffalo Bill

From the moment that Buffalo Bill Cody was buried in 1911 on Lookout Mountain, thousands of visitors have streamed up the Lariat Trail out of Golden from U.S. 6 or taken Exit 256 off I-70 to visit this unique Denver Mountain Park. In addition to the grave, the Museum is a hidden treasure with interactive exhibits on Buffalo Bill and his Wild West Show and nearby historic Pahaska Tepee (the original museum building) hosts a year-round café and gift shop. You can picnic in the Lookout Mountain Shelter and catch 360 degree views that are spectacular. The extensive museum collection has outgrown its cramped 1970s building and DPR is working with the community on a new vision and master plan for the campus. This ad hoc community group, the Buffalo Bill Brainstormers, meets every third Saturday this summer over coffee in the Pahaska café at 10 a.m. The Brainstormers seek other interested volunteers to help transform the Lookout Mountain Campus. Mountain Parks Update

City-wide Survey Reaffirms Importance of Denver Mountain Parks

Real life data continually contradicts the perception that Denver residents neither use nor value the Mountain Parks. As part of the National Citizen Survey, Denver's Budget and Management Office does a yearly survey of Denver residents to gauge their priorities and satisfaction with city services. In the 2008 survey, they added two policy



questions about the Denver Mountain Parks and discover that 85% of people surveyed said that they visited a mountain park at least once or twice a year and even 40% visited between 13 and 26 times a year. The results confirmed the findings in the department's master plan, the Game Plan, and in the recently adopted Denver Mountain Parks Master Plan.

Denver Mountain Parks Map and Brochure on Its Way

The first map and brochure on the Mountain Park system since 1929 will hit the stands this summer. The colorful brochure has original art work done by nationally-known artist, Roger Beerworth and was designed, pro bono, by the Denver firm of Barnhart Communications and its designer Jim Hargreaves. Printing costs will be partially underwritten by VisitDenver (the Convention and Visitors Bureau) and the Denver Mountain Parks Foundation. The brochure will be available in June at key Mountain Park facilities (Red Rocks, Pahaska Tepee, Echo Lake Lodge, etc.) and on the web at www.denvergov.org. Work also is underway on individual park and trail maps. Denver Mountain Parks' new logo, designed by the award-winning artist Michael Schwab, now adorns the individual park entry signs.

Red Rocks Patrons Kick In for Denver Mountain Park

Starting with the 2009 season at Red Rocks, everyone who purchases a concert ticket at Red Rocks will be kicking in two quarters to a special Denver Mountain Parks Revenue Fund. Collected by Theatres and Arenas, that modest 50 cents could add up to at least \$150,000 a year to improve the experience for visitors to the Denver Mountain Parks. Funds raised in 2009 will be used in 2010 for more ranger hours, maps, and trail improvements. Repair of existing and possible new trails at Red Rocks Park also are a priority.

City Park Electric Fountain Returns

The City Park Electric Fountain, reconstructed for its 100th anniversary in August 2008, was turned on for the 2009 season on Friday, May 22, 2009 at Noon.



The Electric Fountain is capable of producing the incredible light and water shows that made it a Denver destination

years ago. Originally constructed in 1908 for the Democratic National Convention, the fountain had not been fully operational for decades. The Fountain was a centerpiece of Denver life, drawing literally thousands of visitors to watch its amazing water and light shows while listening to concert in City Park.

With permission from the Landmark Preservation Commission, Denver Public Works demolished the old concrete fountain vault in order to construct a sound, fully functional replacement utilizing current technology and materials that will sustain the Fountain into the future. The portion of the Fountain visible above the water is virtually identical to the original structure. After the vault and deck of the Fountain were completely restored in April of 2007, the final piece of the project was to add the working labyrinth of plumbing and nozzles, complete with multi-colored lights for fountain show performances.

This remaining work demanded the installation of an enormous amount of complex plumbing, electrical, mechanical and computer features to create numerous geysers and light displays in a synchronized fashion. The majority of the work was done thanks to the tremendous synergy between Denver Public Works and Parks & Recreation, with Parks supplying the knowledge and Public Works providing the facilities to complete the project and bring the Electric Fountain back to life. The Colorado Historical Society, Denver Water and other independent contractors also contributed to the completion of this historically significant Denver landmark.

Today's Electric Fountain proudly uses modern technology including energy-saving LED lights, and will be around for future generations to enjoy. After its initial illumination on May 22, shows will be every 5 -10 minutes from 7p.m. to 11p.m. with lighted shows starting at dusk. During the day the fountain will change patterns every 5 minutes with show fountain shows on the hour.
