**Axum Park Renovations Become a Reality**

First documented through the camera lenses of Park Hill residents, the disrepair of the City of Axum Park at MLK Boulevard and Cherry Street was unmistakable.

The picture will change considerably when volunteers show up in force to build a multi-use perimeter path around the park. All Denver residents are invited to bring friends, family and a picnic lunch from noon to 3 p.m. on Oct. 10 as we celebrate the completion of the new path.

In Summer 2007, the City of Axum Park was identified by local residents through Park Hill Thriving Communities, a program of Denver's Environmental Health, as a "trouble spot" and underutilized community resource. Thanks to the 2007 voter-approved Better Denver Bond Program, and in-kind support from Volunteers for Outdoor Colorado (VOC), Park Hill Thriving Communities (PHTC) and LiveWell Colorado, Denver's Parks and Recreation was given the go ahead to make the Axum Park redesign, renovation and construction a reality.

Tom Kupcho, Senior Landscape Architect with Denver Parks & Recreation describes the new and improved park as a "win-win" all around. "It's a great example of a collaborative effort between citizens, the city, and outside

partners such as LiveWell Colorado," said Kupcho. "Everyone shared a common goal of health and wellness, and now we've got a place where people can recreate and realize that goal."

October 10 marks the beginning of the first phase of renovations, a \$500,000 trail throughout the park. Other landscaping and facility improvements include a new playground and picnic pavilions, which will be completed by fall of 2010.

The City of Axum Park is named for Denver's Sister City of Axum, Ethiopia, a city over 2,500 years old located in the northern Ethiopian region of Tigray. In November 1995, a delegation of Denver officials visited Axum, Ethiopia. As a result of the visit, street was named after Denver.

### **Federal Boulevard Public Meetings**

Denver Parks & Recreation, in conjunction with Denver Community Planning and Development and Denver Public Works, are hosting two public meetings regarding proposed regulatory changes affecting properties along Federal Boulevard. One public meeting will be held in the southern portion of the Federal Boulevard corridor area, and the other will be in the northern section. Properties along Federal Boulevard are subject to a parkway setback requirement, which is a regulation that governs the area between the property line along Federal Boulevard and the building line. This meeting will explain proposed changes to the setback regulations, and provide opportunity for public comment.

## Cherry Creek Trail Complete

After five years of design, planning and construction, the section of Cherry Creek Trail between Holly Street and Oneida Street was officially opened today, Saturday, October 10, 2009. The celebration will take place at 9 a.m. on the Cherry Creek Trail next to the Holly Street Bridge and Cherry Creek Drive South.

This long-anticipated, 1.25-mile section of Cherry Creek Trail runs from the pedestrian bridge at Place Middle School, along the south side of Cherry Creek, under Monaco Parkway and continues along the southern edge of the Creek to where it passes under the new Holly Street bridge connecting to existing Cherry Creek trail. The completed project eliminated six hazardous street-level crossings. The \$1.6 million project was funded by the City & County of Denver, the Better Denver Bond Program, Urban Drainage and Flood Control District, Great Outdoors Colorado and The Greenway Foundation.

"This exciting project is long awaited and much anticipated" said Jeff Shoemaker, Executive Director of The Greenway Foundation. "This much needed improvement will allow trail enthusiasts and user groups of all ages a much safer and more enjoyable experience as they traverse along this invaluable urban amenity."

Commuters, recreational users and children traveling to school (three schools-McMeen Elementary School, RockyMountainSchool for expeditionary Learning and PlaceMiddle School) are close to the trail) will benefit from this new addition.

The new trail was primarily funded by a \$725,000 Grant from Great Outdoors Colorado and the Better Denver Bond Program, with additional support and funding by the Urban Drainage and Flood Control District and The Greenway Foundation.

"We continue to see the benefits of partnering with like-minded agencies to accomplish more for Denver Parks and Recreation, and ultimately, the citizens of Denver," said Kevin Patterson, Manager of Denver Parks and Recreation. "By working cooperatively with Urban Drainage, GOCO and The Greenway Foundation, we are able to provide this amazing new amenity to the City."

## Critter Corner

### Fall in the City



As the weather gets cooler, many young animals begin the search for their own territories and resources. Currently young fox kits, raccoons, skunks and coyotes are branching out so you may see animals more frequently or in areas they hadn't been in before as they search for new suitable habitat, out of the way of the local dominant adults. Be particularly aware when driving late evening to early morning hours when less human activity may encourage inexperienced animals to dash across the road.

New visitors to your backyard may be more common, so if you DON'T want new neighbors look around now to see if you may have attractants! Bird feeders are one of the most common animal attractants; almost all of our local small and mid-sized mammals enjoy snacking on some free bird seed, and also like grabbing up the birds and rodents on the ground underneath. If you maintain bird feeders keep the ground clean beneath them. Keep pet food and water inside; as vegetation goes dormant animals begin to search for more alternate sources of food.

Wood piles, thick vegetation and piles of debris also provide both shelter and potential food sources for wildlife. Insects and rodents hiding in and underneath piles can also make easy meals for hungry raccoons, skunks and foxes. Trim shrubbery off the ground so you can easily see underneath, and animals can't find hiding spots. If you have low spots under your fence where animals can easily slip in and out you can build up the soil or close the gap with inexpensive chicken wire. This is a good time of year to finally seal under patios and decks, making sure animals are out first! If you do get a new critter moving in, responding quickly and appropriately can move it back out again. The longer it has to settle in, the more persistent you'll need to be in your efforts to discourage it. Leaving ammonia soaked rags near resting sites, removing food and water sources

and making areas less accessible can all send the message for an animal to move on. You can find species specific tips at [denvergov.org/wildlife](http://denvergov.org/wildlife), click on the links about the animal you're living with.

Don't mind the local urban wildlife? Then enjoy! This is a great time of year to observe interesting and beautiful local wildlife right in your backyard. Most animals don't cause problems for people and pets, and are just looking for a safe haven in our busy city! Now's a great time to visit our 200+ city parks and natural areas to experience the wilds of Colorado right here at home!

**Central Denver Recreation Center Update**

Last November, when Denver voters said yes to a tax  
increase to fund Infrastructure projects, \$11 million was  
allocated for land acquisition and design services for a new  
recreation center to serve the central Denver area.

Denver Parks and Recreation and Councilwoman Carla  
Madison and Councilwoman Jeannie Robb met on Tuesday,  
September 15 from 6 - 8 pm at the Denver Botanic  
Gardens, Mitchell Hall at 1005 York Street for a public  
meeting and open house to gather public input on site  
selection for a new recreation center in the central Denver  
area. Citizens were asked to discuss your preferences for  
use of "Better Denver" bond dollars for either new  
construction surrounding the Congress Park pool or

acquisition of a new site.

Over 70 Denver residents attended the initial public meeting on the central Denver recreation center bond project on April 1, 2008. Citizens were introduced to current trends and facilities located in today's state-of-the-art public recreation centers. They also participated in a 'Build-a -Recreation Center' workshop where groups designed their ideal recreation center with a hypothetical fixed budget. At the end of the session, each group described their key activities and discussed their opinions and suggestions for desired facilities and programs. This meeting helped Parks and Recreation determine what they're building - aquatics, gyms, meeting rooms, fitness - so that they knew the necessary requirements for the site.

#### **Four More Denver Parks Converted to Recycled Water**

Four parks in the Lowry area were converted to recycled water this summer as part of Denver Water's growing effort to free up more water for drinking purposes by using recycled water for irrigation needs. Crescent, Denison, McNichols and Verbena parks were added to Denver Water's recycled water system this summer.

Recycled water is wastewater treated to Colorado Department of Public Health and Environment standards and can be used for irrigation and industrial purposes. By reusing treated wastewater for irrigation in areas such as parks, Denver Water keeps enough pristine water in its reservoirs to serve about 40,000 households.

Lawns, parks and golf courses that use recycled water are clearly marked with signs. In addition, valve boxes and some sprinkler heads are purple, which is the same color as the pipes used to transport recycled water. Though recycled water is highly treated, it should not be consumed because it does not meet drinking water standards.

The conversion also is part of Denver Parks and Recreation's ongoing commitment to conserving water and being responsible stewards of the environment. These four parks added to the 552 acres of parks using recycled water. In addition to recycled water conversions, Denver Parks and Recreation is improving irrigation systems at 37 parks through the Better Denver Bond Project, an infrastructure bond program. Through these irrigation improvements and upgrades to recycled water in these 17 parks, more than 450 million gallons of drinking water will be saved annually.
