5/5 Denver established ERRC (Economic Relief & Recovery Council).

Forecast of total Denver revenue loss due to COVID-19 = ~\$226,000,000.

4/27 - State shift to 1st stage re-opening ("Safer-at-Home") from original SAHO: Personal-care services and retail businesses may re-open with strict social-distancing in place; restaurants and bars still closed; large public venues still closed; offices may re-staff up to 50% capacity.

5/27 - State shift to 2nd stage re-opening: restaurants open up to 50% capacity w/ social-distancing restrictions.

6/1 - State extends "Safer-at-Home" period to 7/1.

CITY ORDERS:

5/9 - City shift to phased re-opening from original SAHO: Mandatory face-covering in all indoor public settings (or standing in line for access to such settings); business re-opening provisions consistent with state order, with additional guidelines for safe business practices and provisions for vulnerable populations; venues and gatherings for 10+ prohibited through 5/26.

5/27 - City shift to 2nd stage re-opening in alignment with state order. City accepting applications for restaurants to expand outdoor seating into parking lots and right-of-way.

6/2 - City extends "Safer-at-Home" period to 7/1 to align with State order.
