★ PAUL'S PONDERINGS ★

Greetings, D-6ers -

It was certainly welcome relief as January ended with pleasantly warm temps in the 50s and 60s. We are still in winter, and this is Denver, so heaven only knows what the next 50 or so days will be like until the dawning of springtime. But I shall enjoy the respite while it lasts.

Since 1979, Denver residents have been provided a narrow gateway into city government through the establishment of the Registered Neighborhood Organization (RNO) system. These volunteer-led coalitions of neighbors receive notification of city-governed actions slated for their community - zoning changes, marijuana/alcohol license applications, Planning Board Hearings, and the like. When these formal matters come before Council frequent questions asked by members include: "Tell us about your outreach to the surrounding community." "What did your local RNO think about the proposal?" Answers to those inquiries do not strictly govern which way a vote will go, but they do play a relevant role in the decision-making process. In addition to aiding in crafting policy, many RNOs make significant contributions to neighborhood wellbeing by sponsoring a variety of community building events such as movie nights, ice-cream socials, food truck series etc.

Regular readers of this newsletter will be aware that I continue to push for an Office of Community Empowerment that will provide more active support for RNOs, and open the door wider and earlier in the process to welcome residents to play a more meaningful role in their own governance. Mayor Johnston has stated his support for the concept, and we continue to be in dialogue as to how an Office of Community Empowerment might take shape and what its roles would be. In addition to bringing the structure of our RNO system into the 21st century, I see that agency employing a variety of tools to strengthen RNOs ability to serve their community, including financial, educational, legal and staff support.

Below you will find a link to help you determine which RNO/s represent your address, and how to make contact, as well as a list of the RNOs currently active in District 6. Your participation will make your community voice stronger when it matters that it be heard. Please join your neighbors in that effort.

The District 6 office has been modeling our vision of an Office of Community Empowerment for the past few years in a couple of ways. We offer a Community Benefits Fund that offers grants up to \$2000 to RNO's for a variety of projects that strengthen the organization and/or strengthen community alliances. We also hold a District 6 Academy - a series of early evening on-line presentations designed to deepen knowledge of city agencies and processes to once again, empower you to be more active in making Denver the city in which you want to live. ★ SUSTAINABLE 6 TIP ★

In honor of Winter Bike to Work Day, we're listing off some transportation tips for the cold season to make your walk, roll, or ride more amenable to the chilly days ahead. The transportation sector is one of the biggest contributors of greenhouse emissions in Denver. Getting out of your car and using alternative transportation is one of the most impactful ways you can address climate change.

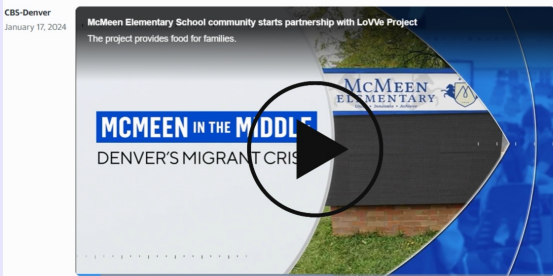

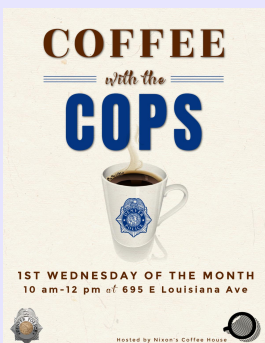

HARNESS THE LOVE: SWAP YOUR DOG'S PINCH COLLAR FOR A FREE HARNESS

As we celebrate love this month, Denver Animal Shelter (DAS) wants dog owners to "[Harness the Love](#)" for their pets and turn in their prong, choke chain and shock collars in exchange for free harnesses or Martingale collars. Prong and choke chain collars are designed to continually tighten around a dog's neck when the owner pulls on the leash or a dog pulls ahead, causing discomfort, pain, possible injury or choking. Shock collars deliver an electric shock or sometimes a vibration or sound when receiving a signal from a remote transmitter.



DAS will kick off the trade-in campaign with an event **Saturday, Feb 3, 9a.m.-1p.m.** DAS' Behavior and Transfer Coordinator, Erin Wyse, CTC (Certificate in Training and Counseling), and five other dog training experts will be on hand to fit harnesses and offer free guidance and expertise on training and behavior modification.

Experts at DAS say harnesses and Martingale collars are humane, providing more control over an animal without choking them. A harness wraps around a dog's torso, reducing tension on the neck when a dog pulls on a leash. While a Martingale collar fits loosely on a dog's neck and tightens only a limited amount when a dog pulls.

Throughout the month of February, the DAS team will expertly fit your dog with a new harness or collar for free at [Denver Animal Shelter](#), (1241 W Bayaud Ave), during regular business hours, while supplies last.

GET PAID TO RIDE YOUR BIKE

Earn rewards by bicycling! **Apply by February 29** to enroll in the latest program from the Denver Streets Partnership, along with Denver's Office of Climate Action, Sustainability, and Resiliency, to explore three different ways to encourage people to ride a bicycle instead of driving to their destinations. The program is aimed at folks who mostly get around by car but would be more inclined to ride a bike in exchange for resources like coaching, a stipend toward bike needs, or cash. Applications from residents of historically disinvested communities in Denver, low-income folks and people of color will be prioritized, since they have been burdened the most from our current transportation system and would stand to benefit the most from participating in this pilot. However, they are accepting all applications, regardless of whether or not you meet these criteria. So if you've looked longingly at your bike sitting unused in your garage and wished you had something to nudge you to use it for transportation (besides, obviously, better infrastructure and policies making it safer and more convenient), [take a look at the program and apply](#) before February 29.

Denver Streets Partnership is also hiring for three part-time Bike Buddies to provide support to the participants in this program. Each Bike Buddy will be assigned to multiple participants and provide up to 4 hours of personalized assistance to each participant, including route-finding for specific locations, and bicycle safety and maintenance. The City and County of Denver Mayor's Office and City Council are seeking applicants to fill two at-large vacancies on the [Human Rights & Community Partnerships \(HRCP\) Advisory Board](#). Established in 2007, the HRCP Advisory Board is made up of 15 members: 10 representatives from the HRCP Commissions and five at-large community members. The agency for [Human Rights & Community Partnerships](#) is an umbrella agency working to create lasting change for all Denver community members through advocacy, capacity building, partnerships, community engagement, and direct services.

Term lengths for members are three years, subject to renewal. Members serve without compensation, except that advisory board members may be reimbursed for expenses incurred in connection with the work of the advisory board. HRCP Advisory Board meetings are held the 4th Friday of every month from 9a.m.-11a.m. These meetings are currently held virtually.

RENT & UTILITY ASSISTANCE OPEN WITH NEW ONLINE APPLICATION



Denver's Temporary Rent and Utility Assistance (TRUA) program is reopening applications beginning January 2! One in three households in Denver is paying more than a third of their income toward housing. TRUA can help with rent payments for up to six months per calendar year. TRUA can also help both renters and homeowners with utility assistance (Denver Water/Xcel Energy).

To qualify, you must live in the City and County of Denver or have been displaced from Denver in the past 90 days, have a household income at or below 80% of

the [Area Median Income](#); and have experienced an unexpected financial hardship or other housing crisis.

MINIMUM WAGE TO INCREASE



The start of 2024 brings an increase in Denver's minimum wage to \$18.29 per hour on Jan. 1, and all businesses should have their payrolls prepared.

The minimum wage adjusts every year based on the Consumer Price Index to ensure wages keep up with Denver's cost of living. The 2024 increase was 5.8%, less than the 2023 increase of 8.94%.

Employers can still claim up to \$3.02 in tip credits per hour for qualified

Big fare changes are here! RTD's new fare system brings lower fares, a reduced number of fare zones, consolidated Discount fares, and decreased costs for 3-Hour, Day, and Monthly Passes. Travel to and from the Airport is included in all Monthly and Discount Passes. We offer decreased costs for Access-a-Ride and introduce Access-a-Ride LiVE fares. The new fare system expands access to the LiVE

SLOW DOWN, DENVER!

Denver has updated the default speed limit from 25mph to 20mph. This change applies to Denver's local streets – primarily the roads with no stripes that go through residential blocks. Additionally, wherever speed limit signs are not posted, the default speed limit will be 20 mph, per [city ordinance](#).

Lowering the speed limit on local streets is part of a broader effort Denver is taking to address safety on our streets citywide. In 2017, the City and County of Denver set an ambitious goal of zero traffic-related deaths and serious injuries by 2030. By reducing the speed limit on our local streets, we can draw attention to the topic of vehicle speeds and help create a culture of safety within our neighborhoods where we are more likely to see people walking and biking.

The Denver Property Tax Relief Program is still open! If you meet certain income rules, you could receive an average refund of \$1,000 from property taxes paid in 2022, or the equivalent in rent. Apply today or share with family and friends who might qualify!

Those who might qualify include renters and homeowners ages 65+, renters and homeowners disabled for all 2022, or homeowners who lived with at least one dependent minor child in 2022.
