All procured from the comfort of wherever I happened to be that offered adequate connection to the cybersphere. Purchased in the light of day and the dark of the night. Seated upright at my office desk. Reclining in bed.

Sometimes I get precisely what I ordered and expected, delivered in stunningly short order. Never had to leave the house. What a deal! Then there are the times when I don't. I ordered a large they sent me an XL. They delivered a shirt with a tag that said large, and it wouldn't fit a chihuahua. I ordered a toaster, I received a TV. Returns/exchanges/refunds are a crap shoot. Sometimes smooth as silk. Others like hollering into the void.

And what happens virtually every time when I shop online - be it a 5-star success or a starless catastrophe - is zero dollars end up in the Denver economy to support shopkeepers or their employees. The vibrant neighborhood shopping districts - S. Gaylord St, S Pearl St, Bonnie Brae, Broadway, Evans and so many more across our city, struggle to keep their doors open to not only provide items we need or want, but to continue to bolster the historic community feel of the neighborhoods we call home.

Our local retail nodes are too important to the fabric of Denver to let them slide into history. It's time we reverse course and return to the halcyon days when commerce was a face to face interaction. When you tried something on, and if it met your approval you brought it to the counter, and if it didn't, you went to the next size or style. And when quite frequently, your retailer knew you well enough to bring you what you were looking for without even needing to ask. When the shopkeeper was as interested in how your family was doing as they were with how much you were spending that day.

To encourage your return to community consumption, we'll begin profiling D6 businesses each month to elevate our local sector of goods and services. We all win when we **Shop 6, Buy Local, SpenDenver**. See you at the market.

What is an RNO . . . and why should you care?

Denver's Registered Neighborhood Organization (RNO) structure was formalized by ordinance in 1979 to create a pathway through which the city would let RNOs know what was coming up in their community - rezonings, liquor licensing, major construction projects and the like - and the RNO would give local neighbors the lowdown, and then let the city know what the neighbors thought about said activities. Unfortunately, the city has done a woefully poor job of supporting RNOs in their work. We think that must change, and our office has been at the lead of efforts to create a new Office of Community Empowerment that will begin its work in coming months, and revitalize the RNO structure to better serve residents and city government alike. Along with some Council colleagues we will be reaching out to gather thoughts of residents citywide on how RNOs can better perform their important work. You'll find us at festivals and markets and other public activities throughout the coming months to gather your thoughts to prime the pump of change. 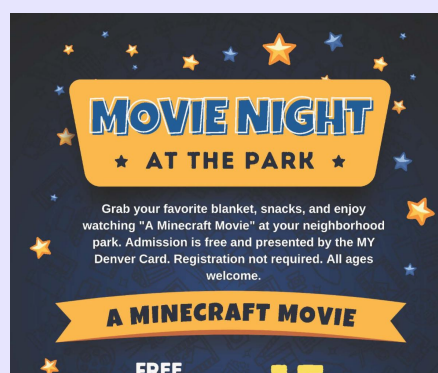

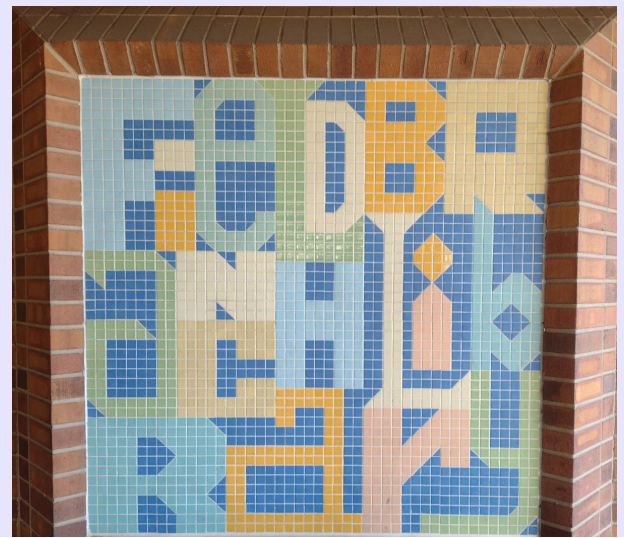

Summer Watering Rules from Denver Water



Summer watering rules for Denver Water customers are now in effect. However, with the recent rains, we ask that you let Mother Nature be your guide and not run your sprinklers

when you see rain in the forecast. The watering rules run through Oct. 1, - [click here to view those rules!](#)

This year, we're also asking our customers with irrigation systems to switch their automatic sprinklers to different days and times to reduce strain on the water system. In asking customers to "Shave The Peak," we're encouraging folks to switch sprinkler timers to run at days and times other than Monday mornings at 5 a.m. This is a default setting for most sprinkler clocks, which means we see a large spike in water use throughout our system right at this time, every week. This "peak" strains the system, requiring us to treat and distribute more water for this moment, increasing energy use and costs to meet elevated demands. [Click here to learn more.](#)

Stay protected against measles this summer



Do you have plans to be on-the-go this summer? Remember, as travel increases, so does the risk of spreading and catching contagious diseases like measles. With measles outbreaks still occurring in parts of the U.S. and around the world, it's important to stay informed and protected.

Measles is more than just a rash, it's a highly contagious viral illness that spreads through the air when an infected person coughs or sneezes. It can linger in the air for up to two hours after the person has left the area. Just being in the same room with someone who has measles can lead to infection if you're not immune.

Measles can spread quickly when people are on the move for international travel, attending large public events like concerts and fairs, or at airports due to

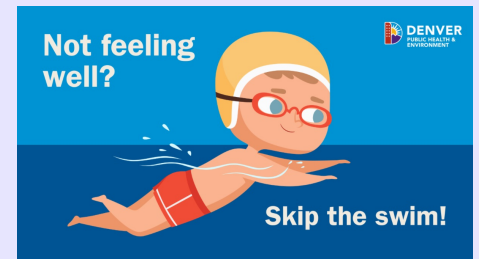

Summer Water Safety



Summer Splash: Dive into Pool Health and Safety



Summer is almost here, which means it's almost time to hit the pool! [The Denver Department of Public Health & Environment](#) (DDPHE) regulates swimming facilities in the City and County of Denver. The Public Health Investigations division inspects public pools located in apartment complexes, hotels, public recreation centers, and health clubs. Inspections are conducted on a routine basis to ensure you and your family are recreating in safe and healthy environments.

It's important for everyone to do their part this summer to keep Denver's pools crystal clear. Don't swim or let your kids swim if sick. Just one person with a stomach bug can contaminate a whole pool! Several of the germs that cause these types of illness can survive in the water for days, even with the use of chlorine. Other germs and viruses can also be spread in the pool, especially to those who may have weakened immune systems.

As summer heats up, remember: [the Denver Department of Public Health & Environment](#) does **not** recommend swimming, wading, or playing in city lakes or streams. Denver's lakes and streams collect runoff from streets, yards, parks, and even discharges from industry and wastewater treatment plants. This runoff can carry bacteria like E. coli that can make you sick.

Naturally occurring bacteria, like blue-green algae (cyanobacteria), can also be found in Denver's lakes. Blue-green algae produce toxins that are harmful to people and pets. Exposure and ingestion of cyanobacteria can cause skin irritation, nausea or more serious symptoms. If you or your pets come into contact with water suspected to be contaminated with blue-green algae, rinse off immediately and monitor for symptoms and contact a physician or veterinarian if needed.

Follow these tips to stay safe this summer:

- Avoid stagnant areas, storm drains, and visible pollution.
 - Wait 72 hours after heavy rain for bacteria levels to drop.
 - Never swallow the water and always wash hands after contact.
- Stay clear of algae blooms that look like green paint, pea soup or scum.

SLOW DOWN, DENVER!

Denver has updated the default speed limit from 25mph to 20mph. This change applies to Denver's local streets – primarily the roads with no stripes that go through residential blocks. Additionally, wherever speed limit signs are not posted, the default speed limit will be 20 mph, per [city ordinance](#).

Lowering the speed limit on local streets is part of a broader effort Denver is taking to address safety on our streets citywide. In 2017, the City and County of Denver set an ambitious goal of zero traffic-related deaths and serious injuries by 2030. By reducing the speed limit on our local streets, we can draw attention to the topic of vehicle speeds and help create a culture of safety within our neighborhoods where we are more likely to see people walking and biking.

Rent & Utility Assistance Open with New Online Application!



Denver's Temporary Rent and Utility Assistance (TRUA) program is open now! TRUA can help with rent payments for up to six months per calendar year, as well as helping both renters and homeowners with utility assistance (Denver Water/Xcel Energy).

To qualify, you must live in the City and County of Denver or have been displaced from Denver in the past 90 days, have a household income at or below 80% of the [Area Median Income](#); and have experienced an unexpected financial hardship or other housing crisis.
