★ SUSTAINABLE 6 TIP ★



Wind. Enemy of bangs, loose leaf papers, and any exposed skin subjected to a barrage of dust particles whipping up in a million little stings. Wind can be a frustrating component to springtime in Denver, but it does have it's benefits. In this month's tip we explore some pros and cons of how wind interrelates with climate change.

- Wind Pro: Wind actually aides in [melting snow](#). The sun is a powerful melting tool but the wind plays her part too. The science behind this is pretty simple, the air hovering above the snow is colder than surrounding air which helps insulate the snow against warmer temperatures. Wind pushes away the cold air near the surface of the snow exposing it to warmer temps.
- Wind Con: Climate change has [increased wind speeds](#) in every 2024

hurricane. Ever-rising ocean temperatures deliver more heat energy fueling a storm's circulation due to increased water vapor rising and evaporating.

- Wind pro: Wind turbines are a promising alternative energy source that have unfortunately been subject to some [negative and incorrect myths](#).



Safe & Healthy Homes: How DDPHE Can Help with Housing Concerns



The Denver Department of Public Health & Environment (DDPHE) is your advocate when it comes to unsafe or unhealthy living conditions. DDPHE enforces the laws related to public health and safety requirements for all residences within Denver.

DDPHE's Residential Health Program protects, preserves, and promotes the health and safety of residents within their homes, and we are here to help if you are experiencing any issues with your living conditions.

If conditions in your home are unsafe, contact your landlord or property management company first. If you're not sure what to say, we've got you covered with a sample letter template [available on our website](#).

If your landlord or property manager is not responding to your request or not fixing the problem, file a complaint with DDPHE. Complaints can be [filed online](#), by calling 311, or by emailing phicomments@denvergov.org. However, if it is a life safety emergency, like a gas or carbon monoxide leak, call 9-1-1.

It is important that unsafe or unsanitary living conditions are reported to DDPHE, especially if you don't have access to necessary utilities like water and heat. Our investigators will respond and intervene to ensure your health and safety.

Meet Denver's Independent Monitor, Lisabeth Pérez Castle!

Lisabeth (Liz) Pérez Castle was appointed as Denver's Independent Monitor in January 2023. She manages a 14 person staff, which includes a team of deputy monitors, a policy team, intake team and community outreach team.

As Independent Monitor, Liz provides independent civilian oversight of all investigations of alleged misconduct of the approximately 2,500 sworn police officers and sheriff deputies in the City and County of Denver.

As monitor she and her staff review complaints of misconduct and disciplinary recommendations. They are tasked with making recommendations for thorough and unbiased investigations and discipline. She and her staff report to police shootings, make training and policy recommendations to the Denver Police and Sheriff Departments and conduct community outreach. Her office provides the community with a bi-annual and annual report.

Denver has updated the default speed limit from 25mph to 20mph. This change applies to Denver's local streets – primarily the roads with no stripes that go through residential blocks. Additionally, wherever speed limit signs are not posted, the default speed limit will be 20 mph, per [city ordinance](#).

Lowering the speed limit on local streets is part of a broader effort Denver is taking to address safety on our streets citywide. In 2017, the City and County of Denver set an ambitious goal of zero traffic-related deaths
